PCjr, ORPHANED? -AN OPINION

THE IBM PCjr, once known informally as the "PEANUT", continues to raise a lot of questions in computer circles and among users. The recent public announcements of "orphaning" have been blamed on a media misinterpretation of what was actually announced by IBM, but what else can we call a "halt in production?" True, support and guarantees will be honored, and much PC-compatible software will run on the Jr., but can we expect software developers to continue to address our on-going needs? With the number of units out "there", a VERY viable marketplace still exists.

Rumors circulate in some circles that a re-configured "Jr" will be placed on the market at a future date, but why bother? A flock of new Japanese IBM PC "clones" are entering the market at prices very near what the "Jr" was selling for at the year-end special promotion! The PC itself is hard to find, having been displaced by the XT and

AT models. Certainly, IBM has taken a corporate black eye with its decision to drop the PCjr - this from the "BIG" BLUE Chip of the industry!

Will it all end here? Many of us got into the IBM PCjr because of its price... as a way to get into the IBM line with its reputation in the business world. Our questionnaires indicate that the largest number of us have small businesses or word processing needs that are not typical of the applications emphasized by the APPLE/COMMADORE crowd. Given our choice again, how many of us would purchase IBM, or gone the MacAPPLE route ...and never returned to the IBM system? Given proper encouragement many of our businesses might expand with larger computer needs, and we would undoubtedly stay with IBM. The losses that IBM suffered during the promotion (rumored to be at least \$200/unit) might have been chalked up to "winning friends", and then made some astute marketing adjustments for the future.

It took IBM a while to overcome initial market snickering at the "Chicklet" keyboards, limited 64K memory and a vacant disk drive hole. IBM had just overcome those "flaws", and gotten on the right track. It's a good SERIOUS computer! Do BIG corporations ever reconsider their decisions?

GROUP JOB DESCRIPTIONS . . .

IN ORDER TO LET YOU PICK THOSE JOBS YOU wish to volunteer for, the following are some loosely defined "JOB DESCRIPTIONS". The current "Steering Committee" (Ginny Dobson, Lewis Jones and Doug Moore), will determine the day-to-day functions as a temporary "Chair" position until the Fall when formal elections can be held without the added confusion of summer. Any/all other positions can be reviewed at that time, too, so if you'd like to try out a position for 4 or 5 months, here's a chance!

THEY ARE (with possible changes/adjustments):

CHAIR(PERSON) (MAY BE MORE THAN ONE PERSON):

(1) Designate authority and oversee the duties of others, (2) Establish meeting date(s) and confirm locations, (3) Act as final authority where a vote of the members is not essential or cannot be waited for.

SECRETARY: Record meetings, act as official correspondent for the organization, maintain the official records of the group.

TREASURER: Handles financial affairs of the group and keep financial records, collect the membership dues (working closely with the Mailing List supervisor). Reports to the Chair and the Group as a whole,

PUBLICITY "PERSON": Supervises distribution of posters, publicity releases, and the telephone bank.

DOCUMENTS LIBRARIAN: Files and maintains the documents relating to hardware and software, may also develop a "CONSUMER GUIDE" of published materials on Jr-specific software and hardware for member's perusal.

DISK LIBRARIAN: Help develop and maintain a library of disk software "in the public domain" for distribution, and perhaps some software for circulation among members, such as tutorials and collected games, etc. This position could best be served by someone who has a 2nd disk drive for copying public domain materials.

MODEM CAPTAIN: Person (with a modem) to serve as contact and "poster" for appropriate bulletin boards around the country.

MAILING LIST "PERSON": Supervises the member-

ship and Newsletter subscriber lists, prints labels once/month, updates list, works with Newsletter editor, Treasurer, and Secretary. Would also help compile membership list for distribution among members.

NEWSLETTER (Editor + Staff): Compile and print a monthly Newsletter for distribution to the membership, non-member subscribers, and also to exchange with other User Groups. Several tasks are available, and ANY member can submit publishable materials.

REFRESHMENTS "CAPTAIN": To be in charge of the food/coffee, etc., and related hardware and clean-up. Does not have to bake cookies but should supervise to see that SOMEONE does! Should be willing to designate tasks!

DEMONSTRATION MACHINE "CAPTAIN": Is responsible to see that SOMEONE (or two) are going to bring PCjr.s to meetings, co-ordinate the specific needs of special speakers with the equipment to be brought (ie. if a printer is needed, etc.)

TOO FAST PCjr REPEAT FUNCTIONS?

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MAGAZINES THAT FEATURE THE PCjr

Here is a listing of some magazines that carry PCjr materials and my biased comments:

BYTE - \$21/yr (12 issues) - Very little (if any) jr info, but good overall computer magazine if you are "into" computers.

COMPUTE! - \$24/yr (12 issues) - A "Best Buy" if you want a good overall magazine for news, software and hardware reviews and some involved BASIC programs to do.

FAMILY COMPUTING - \$19.97/yr (12 issues) - Published by Scholastic Inc. ("Scholastic Magazine"). This is, as it says, a family computing magazine with articles for school-aged children as well as adults. Has simple BASIC programs to try which turn kids on to BASIC programming (but doesn't teach much about BASIC). Some pertinent news and software reviews.

HOME COMPUTER MAGAZINE - \$25/yr (12 issues plus two free discs of programs) - Another "Best Buy" if you want a locally published, good overall magazine for news, software and hardware reviews, a wide range of BASIC programs, and a few LOGO programs. Has the nice option of buying each month's programs on a disk for \$4.95/disk (a small price to pay for reducing the strain on your eyes, nerve endings, and marital relationships, especially if you are planning on typing out one of their longer programs).

PC WORLD - \$28/yr (12 issues) - A more business-

oriented magazine with a small PCjr section. Good if you want to know how the rest of the IBM PCs are doing. Some good reviews and how-to articles on computer fundamentals and on heavyweight software programs. (My preference over it's competition - PC Magazine.)

POPULAR COMPUTING - \$15/yr (12 issues) - Not my favorite magazine, but it does have news, reviews and a few programs.

3-2-1 CONTACT - \$10.95/yr (12 issues) - A children's science magazine published by the producers of Sesame' Street. It has just absorbed the children's computer magazine, "ENTER". It has some good, simple BASIC programs, reviews of childrens' software, and is good even for children who don't have a computer handy.

MAGAZINES THAT ARE IN COMPUTER HEAVEN - When jr first came out several magazines were created specifically for the jr. They have all disappeared from the marketplace. It would be good to have a resource library of articals they contained. We have a few issues of PEANUT Magazine and PCjr Magazine. I understand there was a PCjr WORLD Magazine, a COMPUTE jr! Magazine, and some others as well. If you have any of them and are willing to let us borrow them to copy and return it would be greatly appreciated!

HOME COMPUTER MAGAZINE'S ONE-LINERS

Keep trying, they DO work, but watch carefully each detail. Don't confuse numerals with letters, commas with periods, or forget any spaces. You will notice that HOME COMPUTER prints the numerals in bold type - most helpful. WE have taken the added expedient of enlarging the copy on a Canon copier. **DON'T PRESS ENTER** until the very end... that makes it one line!

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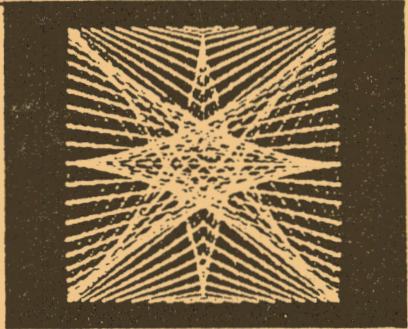

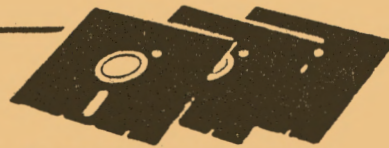

DISK HINTS,

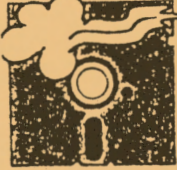


HANDLE THAT FLOPPY WITH T.L.C.!!! So you've read all the CAUTION notices about placing your floppy discs on the monitor where magnetic forces can wipe out the data, right? The same goes for electric clocks, stereo equipment, magnetic clip boards (or kitchen magnets!), magnetic paper-clip holders and the like, ...or the telephone... placing the phone on top of your disc and one ring can scramble it! ALWAYS use felt-tip pens for labels, as a ballpoint pen or pencil can emboss the surface and damage the magnetic media, and don't put one label on top of another, as the added thickness can jam the drive! (Reminders from THE QUILL PEN PAL)

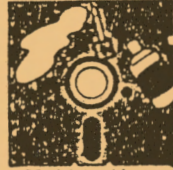

...IF YOU'VE SEEN THE CATCHY ADS for "PERFECT DATA" diskettes from POLAROID, that show a wide variety of potential hazards awaiting the unsuspecting diskette (24 are illustrated), then you may be interested in some tests submitted by editors of some 20 consumer and computer magazines. POLAROID advertises that its free data recovery service can retrieve all or most data from your damaged (POLAROID) diskette, with examples ranging from "Aunt Molly's Jam" to "Hot Dog Mustard".

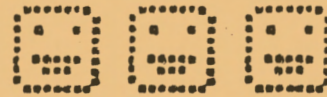
The magazine editors tested the claim by sending in diskettes with rather imaginatively applied "indignities". TIME magazine reports that " staffers at one computer journal poured a hot-fudge sundae on theirs. Another publication sent (one) covered with mustard, catsup and relish." One disk had been chewed by a golden retriever. POLAROID was able to clean the original disk or transfer the data to a new one in all the cases except one,

where less than 100% of the data was retrievable when a user had riddled the diskette with staples! Anyone want to try it?

IBM reduces prices on discontinued PCjr line

NEW YORK — International Business Machines Corp. said Friday it has reduced the prices on its portable Personal Computer, the PCjr home computer and PCjr Color Display. The company announced in March that it was halting production of the PCjr in April and had no plans to resume production. On Friday, the price of the PCjr with 128,000 (128K) characters of user memory and a 360K diskette drive was reduced from \$999 to \$725. The PCjr Color Display was reduced from \$429 to \$399. IBM cut the price of its portable Personal Computer with 256K of user memory and one 360K diskette drive from \$2,595 to \$1,950. The portable PC with 256K of memory and two diskette drives was reduced from \$2,895 to \$2,250.
