### What to Do When Junior Breaks!

Keeping Junior up and running is one of your major concerns. If you live close to your PCjr Club you have very few problems as you can always find help in the membership. But many of our members and newsletter subscribers don't live close enough to attend the monthly meetings. Indeed, we have folks in the wilds of British Columbia, Manhattan and Boonville who never can get to meetings. . . what do they do when Junior breaks? The below article, from the 1991-92 PC Enterprises catalog, has the answers:

The IBM PCjr is certainly one of the most reliable home computers ever sold--nevertheless, even the most reliable computers may, at time, require service. That's why service should be a real concern. What would you do if someday your PCjr should break?

Relax. It's not likely you'll ever need to send your PCjr to the repair shop. Thanks to a considerable number of diagnostic tests which are built into the PCjr, the PCjr may be the easiest computer ever designed to troubleshoot and repair. If your PCjr ever breaks you'll have a choice. You could purchase just the parts that you need, or send your entire system to us and let our trained PCjr technicians diagnose the problem and professionally install any replacement parts that you need.

That's the beauty of owning a PCjr. You'll never have any trouble finding parts or someone knowledgeable to service your computer. Large inventories of PCjr spare parts exist, and should we ever run out of a part, PCE will simply produce one that's better (we've already done this with the internal memory card). Unlike other companies that abandoned the PCjr, PC Enterprises has remained the PCjr specialist and is committed to servicing the PCjr for as long as the need exists.

#### Diagnosing Problems by Yourself

The PCjr's built-in self test allows most people to determine which replacement part they need without sending the system in for service. Once you determine which part you need, repair can be just as simple--even if you're not technically inclined. Here are a few basic things every PCjr owner should know which concerns the PCjr's built-in tests, and what to do if a problem is ever experienced. We suggest you skim through this section now, and refer back if you ever encounter a problem.

While it's always difficult to diagnose a problem without seeing the system, many years of troubleshooting experience with the PCjr often cause us to suspect certain parts. For this reason we've used a "probably, but not

always" approach in this section-- intended to allow you to benefit from our experience.

Each time you turn your PCjr on, the PCjr runs its Power On Self Test (POST). During this test the IBM logo appears while the computer counts its memory. If POST detects a problem it will display an error message when possible. Sometimes POST starts to run, but the problem prevents it from displaying information on the screen. If this happens, you'll see a white or black screen and hear two or three beeps. (This is a good indication that your computer's power transformer and power supply are both okay. If a problem prevents POST from running at all, as a bad transformer or power supply certainly would, you'll always see a white screen and you'll never hear any beeps.)

If the computer does not complete POST, the basic troubleshooting procedure is to identify the problem by removing everything which is not essential to complete POST. Start by unplugging everything from the rear of the PCjr except the power transformer and monitor. Next, remove all cartridges and sidecars, retesting the PCjr after each step. Also, remove the internal Memory Card, Wireless Receiver, and Disk Drive Adapter card. The PCjr should successfully complete POST with just the power transformer, power supply, and system board installed. If it does not, the problem is with one of these parts. If the transformer is warm, it's probably, but not always, good. If you hear the PCjr's fan running, both the transformer and power supply are probably, but not always, good. If you have removed everything from the PCjr except the power transformer and power supply, and you still hear two or three beeps, the system board is probably, but not always, bad.

Always check for bent pins and that your cables are plugged into the correct connectors on the rear of the PCjr. The keyboard, joystick, light pen, and cassette cables are often plugged in the wrong connector. Bent pins, which prevent proper connector alignment, are absolutely the most



common problem that we see and have accounted for white and black screens, two or three beeps, or plug-in items not working. Bent pins found on the rear of the PCjr can cause POST errors B, C, or D and on the 60 pin sidecar expansion bus causing errors A, F, H, I or J. Always check the outside unoccupied bus connector too. Also, when checking for bent pins, remove each sidecar and check all the way back to PCjr. Sometimes multiple pins are bent or sometimes a bent pin goes without notice until a new add on device is purchased.

If the computer completes POST without displaying an error message, you can run additional built-in diagnostic tests. These tests are extremely helpful, especially if you have a memory or disk drive problem. However, if you have more than one floppy drive you may need a Configuration Cartridge to test additional drives.

Always first try to isolate the problem by following the previously described troubleshooting procedure, however, the information below may also be helpful. And remember, if you have a problem, we're just a phone call away. (We will reprint the second half of PC Enterprises' article next month.)

## Purchasing A 2nd Junior

As fall approaches many of us feel that winter is just around the corner. It will soon be time to come indoors from the summer heat and think about things to do inside now that the weather is becoming more brisk. The first thing we do in our home is crank up Junior and see how he made it over the inactive summer months. If you belong to the Eugene PCjr Club, your Junior should be in fine shape as he completed his annual check-up back in April at the "Spring Cleaning." But, just as some folks don't prepare their lawn mowers for winter, some didn't take the necessary steps to keep Junior alive and healthy for another year.

If your Junior sounds somewhat noisy when you boot, maybe it's time to clean it and give it a good check-up. You can refer to chapter 6 in the Guide to Operations that came with Junior, or you can check out a copy from your local PCjr club library. This self-test goes far in showing you how your Junior is doing. If you need to go a little further than just a physical, use the instructions found in the IBM Hardware Maintenance and Service Manual.

There is much you can do as a user to keep Junior happy and healthy. The cleaning will help prolong the life of your disk drive and if you look around the little blower fan attached to the back of the disk drive you will see how Junior's environment is interacting with its components. If someone has been smoking while computing you will see the brown nicotine stains on the fan, disk drive and portions of Junior's motherboard and disk drive controller card. Other things are sucked into Junior by this fan as it tries to keep Junior cool: lint, dust, dog and cat hair, etc. These stains, and the associated dirt and dust that all homes have, help lock in heat causing Junior to fail sooner than he should.

If you have had to purchase a component locally for your Junior you probably already know that very few computer repair shops have anything associated with Junior in stock. While IBM still supports our munchkin, many shops have "moved on" to more profitable machines. . .read: ones that break more often than Junior. This leads us

to the meat of this article: consider buying a spare Junior CPU. I know this sounds ridiculous to many; you don't buy a spare car or TV to keep around in case the one you use everyday should break, but it may be very profitable to do just this for Junior.

Consider the following: You bend or break a pin on the rear of the CPU when a family member moves Junior to another room. Cost of repair, \$50 to \$100 depending on if you remove your motherboard or the repair shop does it for you. Or your power supply gets zapped during a thunder storm; \$35 to \$65--if the shop can find another one to exchange, or if they can do circuit board trouble shooting. Due to low voltage your transformer (brick) dies; where do you go in town to find another? Radio Shack? Think again. If the mother of all boards needs replacing in your Junior, look at the prices from suppliers who advertise in the magazines and newsletters. You have to exchange your old board in some cases, but in all cases, you must do without Junior's familiar hum while you wait for the new or repaired board to arrive in the mail. And take a look at the cost! If you use Thin-Font or a V-20 chip, just pray that the new board doesn't have soldered-in chips.

Juniors have never been cheaper. It is a good time to consider that second machine for many reasons other than just to "part out." When that neighbor kid comes over, or the grandkids, let them play with the spare so none of your favorite games get zonked with sticky fingers or spilled pop. Let them bang on the old chicklet keyboard all they want; they won't hurt the one you use for word processing and they won't spill popcorn on it.

So, here are some guidelines to use when buying a used Junior. Of course, price is important. The CPU and brick can be had at garage sales or through word of mouth advertising for around \$75-- \$100 if they are working. While at this price they may not be in top notch shape, you should make sure they are in at least working order. Boot up and if you get the logo and then "disk boot failure" on the screen, it may be caused by only a faulty disk in the drive, dirt, or even a bad or dirty disk drive. Your club should have someone who will help you determine the problem and advise you. Just remember that a nonworking Junior holds about as much value to someone as



one bookend. Still, even a "dead" Junior has some good working parts and has value to someone with a working Junior. Read on.

A nonworking Junior can be very valuable if you "part it out." Seldom will everything in a Junior break all at once. You may only have to put in a good copy of DOS (one without peanut butter on it), or replace the fuse in the "brick," or the power supply card to have a good spare CPU. Be sure to look at the connectors on the back of Junior. If the pins are broken in the keyboard connector socket, consider using the Synetics internal keyboard adapter. . .or just put batteries in the keyboard and sell your keyboard cord at the next club meeting. If the pins on the display connector are broken, use a monitor that plugs in to the serial port or one that uses the V terminal on Junior.

The IBM color display is a hot item. They can be purchased anywhere from \$75 to \$125 in good working order. Most any TV repair person can refocus them and adjust the horizontal and vertical controls for you if you can't find someone in your club to do it for you. DO NOT open up your monitor and go probing inside. There are megavolts inside, even with the plug removed from the outlet, just waiting to make Junior an orphan again. STAY OUT of your monitor. Still, a dead monitor may only need its internal fuse replaced.

All of this is good reason to become a member of a computer club. In nearly every one of them there is someone who actually enjoys making dying Juniors well, or giving CPR to dead CPUs.

If you can get a used CPU that works, you have a spare power supply (\$50--\$75), 64K card (\$50), disk drive controller card (\$50), disk drive (\$60), diskette drive fan (\$10), external power supply (brick) (\$45), the little infrared keyboard receiver (\$40), another keyboard (\$25), the CPU case (\$30) and a motherboard (\$98). These prices were copied from a recent catalog of a well known Junior supplier. You may also get a spare parallel printer attachment (\$90) or BASIC cartridge (\$20--\$55) and even another copy of DOS. There may be a lot of software with a used Junior.

So read the ads in the newspaper and stop at garage sales; there are many Juniors out there and there is much life left in the old "orphan."

**"Hands On" Classes  
for Club Members**

Club meetings will provide software overviews as part of the regular program, and then there will be additional evening workshop opportunities, using a specific program, to provide a "hands on" experience for those Club members who want to add to their skill level by registering and participating in the appropriate class. The Club meeting demonstration will make it very clear as to what the workshop class will focus on! Members may sign up ahead of time by completing the included registration form and mailing it in, or waiting until the appropriate Club meeting and signing up at that time.

There will be a \$6 Club non-refundable registration fee per one-day workshop or an \$8 fee for a two-session workshop for each registered individual. The fee will reserve a working place in the workshop and also provide the person with a Club Library disk that includes the program being used in the workshop. The workshop host will receive the workshop free. . . anyone interested in "hosting" and "learning" at the same time? Hosting does not imply responsibility for teaching the class--just a place where the class can happen. Part of the registration fee will provide refreshments for each workshop.

Participants need to bring one blank diskette to each workshop so a working copy of the program can be duplicated for "take home" use. Personal ownership of any program used in a workshop is not a pre-requisite for attending and participating. Depending on the specific workshop, each participant will be individually keyboarding a PCjr, or in some cases, two people per machine. Bringing your own PCjr to the workshop is not a pre-requisite for registering. If you should want to use your own machine, let the instructor know and your wishes will be granted.

The thrust of these workshops is to provide opportunities for interested Club members to receive help in actually learning how to make better use of their computer. Club Membership is \$20; this entitles any family member to register for a workshop.

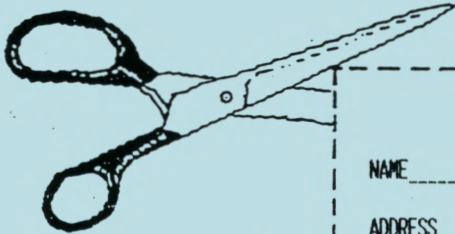
